
KEYNOTE ADDRESS

DR. JUDSON BREWER

Unwinding anxiety: can insights from the science of habit change help how we view and treat anxiety?

Can anxiety and worry be perpetuated like a habit? Anxiety levels are increasing individually and collectively in modern day. Faced with uncertainty, an overabundance of information (and misinformation), among other challenges, our minds struggle to keep up. Our brains default to old survival mechanism to help us deal with anxiety, which can lead to the development of unhealthy coping habits (e.g., stress eating) and ironically feed anxiety as a habit itself. Drawing on his clinical work, neuroscience research studies and development of next-generation digital therapeutics for habit change, Dr. Brewer will discuss the underlying behavioral and neurobiological mechanisms of why anxiety and other habits are formed and how we can paradoxically tap into these very processes to uproot them. He will also discuss how we can apply these insights to improving clinical treatments and to our own lives.

Biography

Jud Brewer, MD, PhD is the Director of Research and Innovation at the Mindfulness Center and associate professor in Behavioral and Social Sciences at the School of Public Health and Psychiatry at the Medical School at Brown University. He also is a research affiliate at MIT. A psychiatrist and internationally known expert in mindfulness training for addictions, Brewer has developed and tested novel mindfulness programs for behavior change, including both inperson and app-based treatments for smoking, emotional eating, and anxiety. He has also studied the underlying neural mechanisms of mindfulness using standard and real-time fMRI, and source-estimated EEG, and is currently translating these findings into clinical use (see www.drjud.com for more information). He has published numerous peer-reviewed articles and book chapters, presented to the US President's Office of National Drug Control Policy, foreign Parliaments, trained US Olympic athletes and coaches, and foreign government ministers and has been featured on 60 minutes, at TED (4th most viewed talk of 2016 with over 17 Million views), in the New York Times, Time magazine (top 100 new health discoveries of 2013), Forbes, Businessweek, NPR, National Geographic, and the BBC among others. He is the author of The Craving Mind: from cigarettes to smartphones to love, why we get hooked and how we can break bad habits (New Haven: Yale University Press, 2017) and the New York Times best-seller, Unwinding Anxiety: New Science Shows How to Break the Cycles of Worry and Fear to Heal Your Mind (Avery/Penguin Random House, 2021). A Fundamental Shift in Industry for UG Compensation Compliance

OMB specifically recognized that alternative methods to effort reporting satisfy the after-thefact review requirement, may reduce burden and removed the word 'effort'. Both NSF and NIH have recently published statements that alternative methods to meet the after-the-fact review requirement are acceptable. NSF OIG and DHHS OIG reiterated that they agree with the agency specific guidance already issued that alternative methods are acceptable and must be supported by a strong system of internal controls per Uniform Guidance (2 CFR Part 200). This session will demonstrate and provide examples of how institutions have integrated a system of internal controls to meet the standards for documenting personnel costs in accordance with the Uniform Guidance (200.430 - Compensation). From Taskwork to Teamwork: Applying the Science of Team Science to Research Support Professionals

Complex proposals, such as center grants, institutional training grants, and equipment grants, require substantial institutional support. This support comes from various units, including research administration, research development, corporate and foundation relations, technology transfer, university counsel, compliance offices (IRB, IACUC), and school/university upper administration (deans, provost, president, etc.). While these offices work for the same institution, they often have differing reporting lines, different strategies for getting things done, and their own language for their work. Strategies for these administrative teams to work together effectively are required to ensure compliance and quality.




